Update from the Director

Welcome to our winter newsletter. In the first half of 2023, we have launched several exciting new initiatives and continue to develop strategies to support our affiliates.

In March 2023 we launched an Institute database management consultation service to support affiliates working on quantitative data management and analysis. We have developed 'Institute Consumer Connect', a program to connect our affiliates with District consumer groups; and are progressing the 'Grant review and ideas development panel', to further support our research network.

We have presented events including a health policy webinar regarding adolescent health, and a first 2000 days webinar on using population health data to optimise child health and development. Our team also contributed to hosting the District's stall at the Sydney Royal Easter Show, where we engaged local community members, teachers and students in our interactive education initiative, 'LifeLab Sydney'.

The Institute seed funding program was opened for applications in April 2023, with the opportunity to apply for up to \$20,000 to support research and quality improvement initiatives. Shortlisted applicants are invited to present at the Research X-Factor event on Monday 7 August 2023.

Our student placement program hosted five Masters of Public Health students from UNSW and USYD in the first half of 2023. These students worked on a variety of projects to support our affiliates.

Finally, our 'Institute Mentorship Program' is being evaluated as its pilot phase has been completed. Affiliates will soon be invited to express their interest in taking part in the next round of the Mentorship Program.

We continue to look for ways to support our affiliates and always welcome your feedback.

Affiliate spotlight

Meet our affiliate Professor Paul Haber

What's your research focus? Developing and implementing new approaches for treatment of alcohol use disorders.



What are you looking forward to this year?

We are implementing new services following the commission of enquiry into the drug ice. We are also implementing four new clinical trials into the treatment of alcohol use disorders. It's a big year for our team.

What has your career path looked like?

I was a medical student at UNSW and Prince of Wales Hospital. I trained in gastroenterology and did a research degree in alcohol-related pancreatitis. I continued research in alcohol metabolism and toxicity at Mt Sinai School of Medicine New York before returning to Sydney, where I took up my present post in addiction medicine at Royal Prince Alfred Hospital in 1998. My role has evolved as our service has grown in size and complexity since then.

What would you like to achieve in the next 5-10 years?

Implementation of current enhancements and service developments take years. I lead a National Health and Medical Research Council Synergy progam for alcohol treatment medications. I'd like to come up with at least one new medical option!

What benefits you as an Institute affiliate?

We are expanding services and research into populations relevant to the Institute: pregnancy, vulnerable families, and young people. I believe there are opportunities for increased collaboration with the Institute.

What is your top research tip or secret?

My mentor Charles Lieber said to me that if you ask a \$64 question, you may or may not get a \$64 answer. But if you ask a \$2 question, you'll never get more than a \$2 answer. So, go for a big question that really matters!

Any recent or upcoming publications?

We completed a trial comparing naltrexone against topiramate for treatment of alcohol use disorders and the findings are close to submission for publication.

Kai has recently worked with Professor David Storey, who is the Adjunct Director of Surgical Skills Laboratory, to develop an endoscopic retrograde cholangiopancreatography training model. A validation study was conducted last year, and an article titled 'Anatomical endoscopic retrograde cholangiopancreatography simulator using moulded meshed silicone: A novel simulator pilot study' has been accepted by the ANZ Journal of Surgery.

Dana Georgevsky Research Officer and Trial Coordinator Women and Babies

Royal Prince Alfred Hospital

RPA performed their first living donor uterine transplant case in February 2023. The recipient is a 25 year old female with Mayer-Rokitansky-Küster-Hauser (MRKH) syndrome, which is a congenital condition where a person is born without a uterus, cervix, and upper portion of the vagina. The living donor and recipient are recovering well, and neither have encountered any significant complications thus far. Dana is continuing in her role as the coordinator for this important trial and provides support to clinician researchers and patients. Dana and the team have recently published on this with an article titled 'First uterine transplant case at the Royal Prince Alfred Hospital' in the ANZ Journal of Obstetrics and Gynaecology.
