Invitation to present at international conference

Associate Professor Brad de Vries (Head of Obstetrics at RPA, Research Director for Women's Health, Neonatology and Paediatrics SLHD, and Institute Management Group Member) has been invited to present an important study at the annual Society for Maternal and Fetal Medicine Pregnancy Meeting in Washington DC in February 2024.

The study Brad will be presenting, titled *Inter-pregnancy interval and uterine rupture among more than 500,000 Trials of Labor after Cesarean (TOLAC)*, is a retrospective cohort study utilising data from the United States through an international collaboration with Professor Vincenzo Berghella from Jefferson Medical College in Philadelphia.

The study is co-authored by Institute Database Manager Pejman Adily who has been working closely with Brad, as well as colleagues from RPA Women and Babies including Associate Prof Hala Phipps, Dr Travis Bettison, Dr Adam Mackie and Dr Raji Narayan. Dr George Johnson (Institute Director) and Dr Marjan Haghighi (Institute Senior Research Officer) are also contributing to the paper.

We'd like to congratulate Brad and his colleagues on the lifetime achievement of presenting at this eminent meeting next year.

Affiliate spotlight

Meet our affiliate Dr David Zalcberg

Staff Specialist Anaesthetist and Director of Obstetric Anaesthetics RPA Hospital





What's your research focus?

The predictive impact of brain biomarkers in newborn babies and the ability to predict a lack of oxygen in the brain during childbirth. Over time, we hope to expand this research to use these biomarkers to identify babies suffering from oxygen stress during delivery, adding confidence to the decision making paradigm during childbirth. Currently, we rely on indirect measurements of oxygen stress. This new research aims to give us a clearer picture of the degree of neurological stress immediately after birth to determine those babies who will benefit from early intervention to minimise the long term impact on their development.

What are you looking forward to this year?

After successfully completing BABBIES-1 we are writing up our findings for publication and planning the next phase of our research - this will be a multi-centred trial focusing on a large number of deliveries, measuring brain biomarker levels in high risk deliveries, and comparing these to the currently available prognostic tests. We also want to start follow up for these patients, evaluating how the delivery effects growth and development in early life.

What has your career path looked like?

I started medicine in 1999 in Melbourne however chasing a sporting dream took me overseas and I deferred study for 4 years. I ultimately returned to Australia and juggled my sporting commitments (sometimes flying to Europe for the weekend to compete!) and university. I struggled to decide which area of medicine I was most passionate about, and initially thought I would head down the physician training pathway. After an elective in trauma medicine in Copenhagen, Denmark I formed some clarity around the idea of doing anaesthetics. During my internship at The Alfred in Melbourne, I would come into theatres on my days off to try and see if it was the right path for me. After doing critical care at The Alfred in 2010, I moved to Sydney to start my anaesthetics career so my partner could be closer to her family.

I loved training at St. Vincent's Hospital in Darlinghurst, and felt very supported. I worked with great people and learnt from colleagues who I consider career defining people.

I decided to undertake a second fellowship at RPA in 2017, and was overwhelmed with the environment. Coming from a small hospital to working with so many legends in the field and a hospital which was at the cutting edge of almost every speciality was unimaginable. I was lucky enough to be offered a staff specialist position at the end of that fellowship, and have been in this role at RPA ever since. In 2021, I took on the role of Director of Obstetric Anaesthetics at RPA which became incredibly challenging with the emergence of COVID-19! Outside of obstetrics I am also interested in airway anaesthesia, peritonectomy and paediatrics.

What would you like to achieve in the next 5-10 years?

This might sound very unambitious but I don't think I have a specific goal. Of course it would be fantastic to have a proven biomarker which changes the way we approach intrapartum care - but if I'm completely honest my goal is just to enjoy the journey - to stay in the present and get the most out of all of my experiences.

What benefits you as an Institute affiliate?

It's wonderful to work in an environment with a focus on women's health. There are so many international experts who are affiliated with the Institute and it's great to collaborate with them to improve clinical care.

Tell us about your experience applying for seeding funding through the Institute, and what presenting at the Research X-Factor was like.

I first applied to the program in 2022 and was unsuccessful, but Professor Rob Sanders was extremely positive and pushed me to keep going and so we decided to apply again in 2023. I usually don't mind public speaking but getting up in front of a group of neonatal, obstetric and research experts - about a topic I am not an expert in was VERY nerve-wracking!

What is your top research tip or secret?

Find a good mentor. For me that is Professor Rob Sanders. As an emerging researcher he has given me so much confidence - I probably wouldn't have dived into research so far down the track in my career without his encouragement.
